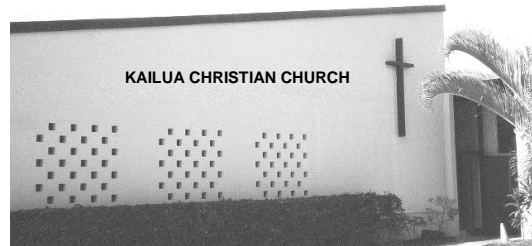

(Psalm 121)

Where do you go when you need help? Who do you turn to when you are confused, or hurt, frightened or feeling all alone? Is the promise that God is with us always, every one of us, too good to be true? Can we, do we, trust the word of the Lord and allow it to seep into our hearts and minds in a way that gives us true healing, true peace, true comfort and strength for the wondrous journey of this day and tomorrow?

One of the greatest joys that I have experienced the past 8 years living with you on the Windward side of Oahu, is lifting my eyes time and time again to the beauty and majesty of the Ko'olau Mountain range in the backyard of all Waimanalo, Kailua, and Kaneohe residents. My wife tells the story of when we were searching for a single-family home two years ago and first visited the house we live in now. She and the children were unimpressed with the aging house and shabby yard. When they turned to go they could not find me. Finally one of them noticed that I was out on the deck in the backyard, staring off into the distance. Apparently my words to them were, "We need to try and purchase this house!" I was sold on the view. All other things could be remedied, but the view of the Ko'olau in the distance were the soul-feeding enrichment and inspiration that I knew would sustain me and the family as long as we are in that place. It is still a miracle and wonder to me that our offer finally went through, but that is another story.

During our youth camp at the Ho'omaluhia Botanical Garden in July, we sent 11 youth and 5 adults off on a personal "Morning Watch" early Saturday morning. This is a time of quiet reflection and devotion to begin one's day. The scripture passage that each person took with them was Psalm 121, which I hoped would be especially poignant as each of us truly did lift our head and our eyes to the hills, the towering cliff walls right before us as the early morning sun and cloud came alive in a unique display of dynamic color and contour. Could the youth feel the living presence of God all around them, an ever present help in times of both trouble and ease? I wonder. I hope.

Our lives are filled with experiences that we describe as up and down. Joyous times when we might actually forget God's presence, and difficult times when we question why God is picking on us. In times of ease and in times of challenge can we, do we, lift our eyes to the hills either figuratively or literally and call upon the Lord, creator of heaven and earth to be our help, our keeper now and forever? God is ever present. Let us give thanks for this truth, this assurance, this hope and promise. May it encourage and sustain every one of us, freeing us from needless and destructive worry and fear of the unknown. You belong to the Lord, and the Lord is with you forever. Open your eyes to see, remember, and confirm this truth right now and always. Praise be to God!

May her presence, her ability, and her spirit be an effective tool of the Spirit of God in this place, energizing worship, and helping to prosper KCC in faithfulness and effectiveness to the glory of the One who is our reason for being. NOTES FROM THE MODERATOR

Sometimes the work of the church becomes overwhelming; and, I often need to remind myself that, I have chosen to remain in active service because I believe it is God’s call. I have begun to wonder what it is like to be the Pastor, where one cannot easily separate oneself from the welfare of the church nor the people being served. I am in awe of this profession where service is not truly a choice. But should you speak with Pastor Tim, he will describe his life’s call as an expression of faith, where choices need not be made and service a natural occurrence of the spirit.

Recently, the welfare of the church has taken a very pragmatic direction; and as your moderator, I am sure this is demanded of your elected Council and Board members. As stewards of the Church’s resources, we are entrusted by the membership to be responsible, yet responsive to the church’s needs and maintenance.

Church in the 21st Century is not a simple endeavor. While core messages remain basic throughout the ages – to love and serve one another and others; and to share the word of God with the wider world, it is becoming increasingly difficult in a society of such diversity. How do we, at KCC remain true to the practices of the past, but contemporary enough to attract individuals who are exposed to a wider expansive world supported by new thoughts and methods of communication. Faith messages vary...some instill faith through fear; some promise wealth through faith; some require full compliance with the Word of God as printed in the Bible. What is the message we at KCC want to share? How do we remain relevant to all who worship at KCC, to those who come to our door and to those who are still in contemplation? This is the core of the conversation engaged in by your Council. In the next few months, we will engage you in challenging conversation. Some of the seeds for this were sown at our annual retreat held on Saturday, July 7, 2012. At that event, we set as our goal the desire to be a vibrant living church of God. Approxi

mately 40 individuals representing the various cross sections of the church were present. Roy Yamauchi also presented a comparative “study” of KCC budget appropriations over the past few years. It is the intent of the Council and Trustees to create conversation about how KCC funds have been distributed; and, how with paradigm shifts we may more efficiently and effectively support the efforts that will help grow KCC. It will not be easy but is necessary. It will also require ultimate faith that God will lead us and that we will remain open to his still speaking voice.

A NOTE FROM YOUR MUSIC DIRECTOR

After attending a conference on Oahu for International University Professors, I had found the assurance that I was hoping for: that Hawaii might be a good place for my family to move to. I was, both before and after, surprised to discover it to be a place that embraces music in its own present culture, and welcomes people in a way that is, much like the hula-dance, beyond words.

During that time in my life, I needed to escape a hazardous working environment in a city where I was an actual University Professor; I try so hard to make peace, as Jesus advises, in order for me to be blessed according to God's word. Many people can imagine the amount of uncertainty that occurs when decisions are made to move to another city. So many things could go wrong. Well, for whatever reason God has in mind, my family and I were blessed to have met Carmen, a member of Kailua Christian Church, who eventually introduced us to this church. Now, my family is of the uttermost opinion that this is the absolute best church we have ever been invited to in our lives. Furthermore, they are so wonderful that they have allowed us to be their friends.

It is my present view that I feel it best for you to come and meet some of the many great people involved and/or are attending, and that you come and sing in our new choir to develop your voice and health while giving gratitude to our creator: such give and take is what is often referred to as 'worship' or 'praise'. (Our KCC choir will begin practice on Sunday, August 5 following worship.)

I've been making music as long as I can remember. I started playing piano at four, singing at nine, and composing at age ten. My first piece was performed with choreography while in elementary school, and while in high school, I won "The October Prize in Composition" for the city of Belgrade, the capital of the former-country of Yugoslavia. Soon after my BFA was completed in 1988, I received a letter from Carnegie-Mellon University in Pittsburgh, with an offer for a full scholarship.

It is such a great experience to be involved in productions especially when having your pieces performed by small or large orchestras. I successfully completed my Master's in Composition in 1992. I continued my studies at the University of Pittsburgh and received my Ph.D. in Music Philosophy in 2001. What is most remarkable to me in all of this, is the amount of financial responsibility I had to maintain on the side while achieving my degrees. Eventually, I discovered that I had followed the road that my parents had advised: to possess as many positive traits as possible.

As a composer, I have come to appreciate all styles of music, and not necessarily all genres of music. Sometimes a lack of art in music does literally sadden me; while on the other hand, so many types of music interest me and make me want to study more, or to live still longer so that I can learn everything there is to know.

I would like to end this article in thanking Kailua Christian Church for letting my family witness an event in life that involves God's perfect idea of the concept of sharing. Of course there is usually so much more that anyone could say to clarify their point if given a chance. Again, my thought is that it might be best to come and see or experience for yourself how great it is to give thanks to God together as one.

KCC HAS SOMETHING TO SING ABOUT!

A warm welcome to Tatiana Dutoit, our new Music Director. Tatiana comes with an impressive resume and we are truly fortunate that she chose to use her gifts at our church. Her strengths are in piano, music composing and singing and teaching all three. Her references indicate her gift of music and faithfulness and she comes highly recommended. Her music education started at the University of Belgrade in Serbia, and then Carnegie Mellon University, and then the University of Pittsburgh, where she obtained her Ph.D in Music Philosophy, Composition, and Theory. We look forward to her special talent being shared at KCC. Tatiana's husband Zach, also has a musical background and we welcome him into our church family, too.

Attention all youth and youthful in heart (with semi-strong legs)!

We are offering a **hike** for the youth group of KCC and for the wider ohana (younger and older) on Saturday, August 11. We are going to hike the Kuliouou Ridge Trail (near Hawaii Kai), which is a significant 5-mile round trip hike. Please be aware that this activity will take about 4 hours, and although it is not a difficult hike, the distance

does require some effort and dedication on the part of us hikers! The majority of the trail is wooded and very beautiful. About two-thirds of the way up are some covered picnic tables in an Ironwood grove. Some hikers may decide to stay and rest at this location while the rest push on to the top of the Ko'olau range with breathtaking views of Waimanalo below. The wait at the picnic tables may be a little longer than an hour before the other hikers return (Bring a book or playing cards to help pass the time if you plan to rest and wait here). The final part of this hike does become steeper, although this trail is never harder than the Olo Mana hike that we have done several years in a row. The final part of the hike will be in the sun, so water, sun block and light snacks will be very important, as well as proper footwear (tennis shoes are fine). We will gather at the church and leave promptly at **7:30 a.m.** so that we do not get a late start on the trail. When the hike is finished, we will have lunch at Burger King near the Costco in Hawaii Kai before returning to Kailua, perhaps around 2:30 p.m.

This hike requires some effort, but is another opportunity to help build the confidence and character of our youth at KCC, while appreciating and celebrating the unique beauty of the Hawaii that we live in. If you would like to be part of this hike, please contact the church office so that we can keep an accurate list. More details to follow, but mark your calendars now for this unique and mildly (?) challenging opportunity! Pastor Tim will be leading this event with the help of several other adults. We will take the 15-passenger church van, but may need adults to drive their vehicles, as well, depending on the total number of hikers.

MISSIONS NEWS

One of KCC's many strengths is that we are blessed to have a sanctuary and facilities where we can worship God, build community, and do God's work. As I participated in the congregational cleanup on July 14, I thought of the many Missions that KCC is able to do because we are blessed to be stewards of God's house;

- KCC provides a Transitional Housing Unit which provides shelter and sanctuary for homeless families, many families have "graduated" from our housing unit into permanent homes; Leader Ruth Uyechi.
- KCC shares with the Chuukese 4C's church God's sanctuary and resources; Leaders Pastor Tim, Joan Sakaba, Karel Ling, and Sats Nemoto.
- KCC provides facilities, a safe haven, privacy and food for the Family Promise families four weeks/year; Leaders Dan Jessee, Bryan Gomes
- KCC prepares healthy suppers in KCC's kitchen four times/year for the poor in the River of Life ministry; Leaders Dan Jessee, Bryan Gomes
- KCC prepares Habitat for Humanity worker lunches in our kitchen; Leader Barb Gomes
- KCC provides community outreach to young families and Christian fellowship through KCC's Playgroup ministry; Leader April Jessee
- KCC provides classroom space to the Bible Institute of Hawaii so that God's word can be further shared in our Windward communities and beyond; Leader Kammy Grable

One of our stewardship projects for July 14 was to refresh the paint on KCC's doors. Our team of painters ranged from master painters like Myron Tamura, Richard Esaki, Ken Nakamatsu and Ruth Uyechi to apprentices like myself, Thomas Gomes, Joshua Weible, Rayn Jessee and Joslyn Dyer.

It was truly inspirational to see multiple generations working side by side on the upkeep of God's house. The youth were especially impressive as they leaped from apprentices to masters in a short time. FOODLAND: GIVE ALOHA PROGRAM 2012

Give Aloha is an annual program through which Foodland directs its charitable giving to the organizations that are important to its customers. During the month of September only, Maika'i customers are invited to make donation(s) up to \$249 (per person, per organization) at checkout to Kailua Christian Church UCC, #78524. Foodland matches a portion of each donation.

Donations made can be spread out throughout the month with a maximum credit given to each Maika'i card holder in the total amount of \$249.00 by the end of September. Each time you shop and decide to make a donation, request a receipt that you will turn in to KCC with your name on it so we can credit your giving statement for the donation amount given. In turn Foodland will give KCC all the funds donated by KCC supporters plus a percentage above that—last year KCC received an added \$2,988.28 from Foodland just by participating and your generous support. The program is only active from September 1-30.

Donations must be made using a Maika'i card in order to receive a matching gift. Donations made without a Maika'i card will go to your organization, but will not be matched with Foodland and Western Union's \$350,000 matching gift funds. (Double check your receipt for notation of Maika'i card donation before you leave the store.)

To receive a free Maika'i card, let the cashier know you would like to open up an account, give them a phone/cell number or any 10 digit identification number for you, which they will then issue you a temporary account (a permanent card will be issued if you continue to use it and make purchases of \$250 total to that Maika'i account – Through this program you will benefit with other perks and store discounts).

Plan ahead in your giving for 2012 by participating in this program during the month of September, when donations will benefit a larger yield. Please see Bryan Gomes or contact the office for assistance in this program. Mahalo!
