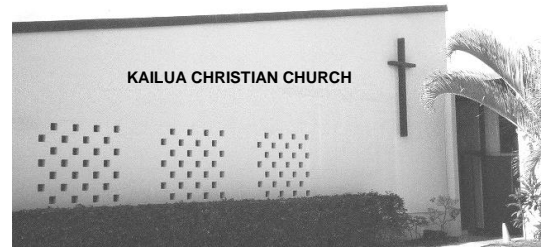

"Then God said, 'Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness;...' (Genesis 1: 26)

On Saturday morning a couple of weeks ago, five men from Kailua Christian Church gathered at Zippys restaurant in Kailua for our monthly Men's Group fellowship. Recently we stopped meeting at the church in favor of a bigger breakfast menu! At these gatherings there is always plenty of talk story going on as well as some focused scripture reading and faith conversation. The gathering is fun and also supportive as we catch up with one another and share the joys and struggles of life together...man style!

Although it wasn't the focus topic, we started to share experiences we have had in which we felt discriminated against by the wider population around us. Everyone had a story to tell and it became clear that experiences of discrimination and prejudice are not just limited to people of different races or ethnicities, but happen within races and cultures, too. There are only a few places on this earth where we fit in as locals, and countless places where we are the outsider, the foreigner, the one who does not easily fit in. And although we like to think the best of ourselves, there are likely as many times when we have discriminated against others as there are times when we have felt discriminated against (although we always talk about the latter).

We discussed how it seems natural to be attracted to people who look like ourselves and talk like ourselves. There is comfort in this, and I personally find it to be a fascinating thing. Folks "like me" are often surprised to learn that I don't share

the same thoughts or outlooks that they thought we would. Living in another culture for 12 years does that to a person. It is curious how we are cautious about approaching and getting to know someone who is obviously different than ourselves. And when we are the one who is the extreme minority, it is easy to feel insignificant and ignored.

Although we are all created in God's image, we are constantly and often subconsciously zeroing in on those things that make us different from one another, and therefore a potential threat to each other. It is not always easy to step out of our preferred comfort zone and truly befriend someone "different". This is why I am such an advocate of everyone, especially youth and young people, going to live in another country or culture for as long as possible. You are forced to recognize that you yourself are the minority person and you must come to terms with this painful reality, learning to deeply appreciate those who come to love and accept you even though you are the different one.

Such an experience changes us. Experiencing this, we are quicker to see and value the diversity of people around us rather than being skeptical and fearful. Diversity and difference will never mean deficiency. In fact, if humankind is created in the image of God, woman and man, Middle Easterner and Hawaiian, then God must truly celebrate diversity...in all of its forms! Think deeply about this the next time you find yourself defining how you are different than or perhaps better than another person or culture.

For surely God does not see others the way that we so often do. God looks upon the heart and

must always see the image of God's very self within before moving on to other thoughts and judgments. And so love is always the operative rule of God's thoughts and actions. Can we see and do the same, I wonder? Let us love God, yes, and demonstrate this fully by loving our neighbors as we love ourselves.

**MISSIONS NEWS****Transitional Housing Update**

On August 9, after less than 4 months in the T/H facility, our guests, a single mother and two children transitioned into a housing program that offers affordable rental units for up to 2 years to achieve their ultimate goal of permanent housing.

It began on April 15 that this family achieved its first goal of leaving the shelter of Institute of Human Services (IHS) and became guests in the KCC TH apartment. In the privacy and peaceful surroundings it offered a place for family to consider "home" for a short time. Working closely with the IHS caseworker, the family applied to various housing programs and explored other opportunities while mom worked part time as a substitute teacher. For most programs there are waitlists. At a time when public housing is not "moving" (in the words of a caseworker), waitlists for affordable rentals do not "move" and the wait for an affordable unit may well be prolonged. When such a unit became available for our guests, it was cause for great celebration and praise! As put wisely by our Caseworker, it becomes prayers bringing about change.

Our guest family was very thankful for having been able to live here and also very thankful for two faithful and generous members. Pastor Tim and Lowell Terada "went beyond the call" to provide a truck and muscle power to transfer household goods from storage to their unit in Waimanalo. Prayers and blessings go with the family on the journey toward their ultimate goal of achieving permanent housing.

**NEIGHBORS IN NEED OFFERING**

The Neighbors in Need Offering, which we will receive on Sunday, Oct. 7, supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. Through UCCTakeAction.org, our national Justice and Witness Ministries office offers resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immi-

gration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice. NIN also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forbears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hockak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S. Neighbors in Need helps make another world possible. The same note of appreciation and a monetary gift was sent to Mel Yamashita who installed the doors. He was a perfectionist and also extended himself on the project. Bert Yoshioka was also instrumental in getting the job done. As you can imagine these doors are very heavy and his assistance as well as the use of his truck made this project possible. Thank you all!

Bert Yoshioka continues to engineer the pigeon proofing of the second floor walkway. He has installed some brackets and fishing line on the hand rails to prevent the birds from sitting on the rails with the resulting mess on the walkway. A special kudos also to Bert and wife, Judy for faithfully coming to water and do yard work every Monday afternoon. They have provided tremendous support towards the care of our grounds.

We reviewed the request of Toyoko N. O'Neil and Akiko Iwasaki to use the nursery to operate a Japanese Language School for children, Nakayoshi Class. The classes are proposed for 9 a.m. to 12:00 noon on Mondays and Tuesdays. Your Trustees have reviewed their proposal and have recommended pursuing this project with Council.

### **FOODLAND: GIVE ALOHA PROGRAM 2012**

Give Aloha is an annual program through which Foodland directs its charitable giving to the organizations that are important

to its customers. During the month of September only, Maika'i customers are invited to make donation(s) up to \$249 (per person, per organization) at checkout to Kailua Christian Church UCC, #78524. Foodland matches a portion of each donation.

Your donations are now being received and can be spread out throughout the month with a maximum credit given to each Maika'i card holder in the total amount of \$249.00 through this month. Each time you shop and decide to make a donation, request a receipt that you will turn in to KCC with your name on it so we can credit your giving statement for the donation amount given. In turn Foodland will give KCC all the funds donated by KCC supporters plus a percentage above that. Last year KCC received an added \$2,988.28 from Foodland just by participating and your generous support. Let's try to at least achieve this goal. The program will end on September 30.

***Donations must be made using a Maika'i card in order to receive a matching gift.*** Donations made without a Maika'i card will go to your organization, but will not be matched with Foodland and Western Union's \$350,000 matching gift funds.

(Double check your receipt for notation of Maika'i card donation before you leave the store.)

To receive a free Maika'i card, let the cashier know you would like to open up an account, give them a phone/cell number or any 10 digit identification number for you, which they will then issue you a temporary account (a permanent card will be issued if you continue to use it and make purchases of \$250 total to that Maika'i account – Through this program you will benefit with other perks and store discounts).

Plan ahead in your giving for 2012 by participating in this program during the month of September, when donations will benefit a larger yield. Please see Bryan Gomes or contact the office for any assistance regarding this program.

Rides during September may be available to Foodland to assist with this transaction. Please inform the office of your interest in this. Mahalo.
